FROM OUR SEMINARIAN

Palm Sunday 2023

Dear Brother and sister in Christ,

Today is Palm Sunday, and we begin Holy Week with the whole Church. Holy Week is an important week in the calendar of the Catholic Church, which has many liturgy rites to express the passion and resurrection of Jesus Christ. In this Holy Week, the Church invites us to participate in Masses in the Church, especially with three sacred days called Tridium: Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter Vigil (Saturday night).



In this Holy Week, we are called to listen to the Word of God and meditate on the love of God who is ready to die to save humanity. Jesus is the true God and true man who obeys His Father to come to the earth and dwell with us, "Who, being in very nature God, did not consider equality with God something to be used to his own advantage; rather, he made himself nothing by taking the very nature of a servant, being made in human likeness," (Philippians 2:6-7). Each of us is invited to open our hearts to receive Holy Communion in Holy Week and the Easter season.

The death of Jesus is completely voluntary for all people, and He gives Himself for humanity. This is unconditional love. He is a good shepherd and does God's will as Saint Paul said, "Christ loved us and gave himself up for us as a fragrant offering and sacrifice to God" (Ephesians 5:2). Moreover, through the Passion and resurrection of Jesus Christ, He brings us the hope in our faith that we will be raised to live with Christ. As Saint Paul said, "If there is no resurrection of the dead, then not even Christ has been raised. And if Christ has not been raised, our preaching is useless and so is your faith" (1 Cor 15: 13-14).

The Passion and resurrection of Jesus Christ bring the love of Christ to those who are still suffering, hopeless, and sick. As Pope Francis states, that "it is the victory of love over the root of evil, a victory that does not 'by-pass' suffering and death, but passes through them, opening a path in the abyss, transforming evil into good: this is the unique hallmark of the power of God" (Urbi et Orbi Massage of His Holiness Pope Francis, Easter 2020).

May the resurrection of Jesus Christ always be with you, your family, and our parish. Happy Easter 2023 to everyone Phong Quang Le

Palm Sunday Reflection: History of the Rosary Taken from: The History of the Rosary | EWTN

The origins of the rosary are "sketchy" at best. The use of "prayer beads" and the repeated recitation of prayers to aid in meditation stem from the earliest days of the Church and have roots in pre-Christian times. Evidence exists from the Middle Ages that strings of beads were used to count Our Fathers and Hail Marys. Actually, these strings of beads became known as "Paternosters," the Latin for "Our Father."

The structure of the rosary gradually evolved between the 12th and 15th centuries. Eventually 50 Hail Marys were recited and linked with verses of psalms or other phrases evoking the lives of Jesus and Mary. During this time, this prayer form became known as the rosarium ("rose garden"), actually a common term to designate a collection of similar material, such as an anthology of stories on the same subject or theme. During the 16th century, the structure of the five-decade rosary based on the three sets of mysteries prevailed.

Tradition does hold that St. Dominic (d. 1221) devised the rosary as we know it. Moved by a vision of our Blessed Mother, he preached the use of the rosary in his missionary work among the Albigensians, who had denied the mystery of Christ. Some scholars take exception to St. Dominic's role in forming the rosary. The earliest accounts of his life do not mention it, the Dominican constitutions do not link him with it and contemporaneous portraits do not include it as a symbol to identify the saint.

In 1922, Dom Louis Cougaud stated, "The various elements which enter into the composition of that Catholic devotion commonly called the rosary are the product of a long and gradual development which began before St. Dominic's time, which continued without his having any share in it, and which only attained its final shape several centuries after his death." However, other scholars would rebut that St. Dominic not so much "invented" the rosary as he preached its use to convert sinners and those who had strayed from the faith. Moreover, at least a dozen popes have mentioned St. Dominic's connection with the rosary, sanctioning his role as at least a "pious belief."

As we prepare for Holy Week and reflect back on all the rosaries we have prayed together. Let us sing Hosanna to the highest, blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Our rosaries are powerful weapons which lead us and our loved ones (all whom we pray for) closer to Jesus through Mary. This week is the perfect week to reflect even more on the sorrowful and glorious mysteries. Let us lay down our cloaks, our pride, selfishness, anger, frustration, fear, anxiety, etc.-- at the feet of Jesus as we process with Him into Jerusalem and head towards Calvary. Let's together contemplate the ways we have participated in HIS crucifixion and remember HIS great love and mercy for us. The redeemer of our souls. Let us sing joyfully of his glory and give him praise.

Scripture to Ponder: John 19

Fasting Idea: Consider fasting for 3 days as we journey to Calvary. This could be from coffee, soda, favorite snack or even to only eat bread and drink water for 3 days. (Pray and ask God what he would like for you to fast from). **Almsgiving idea:** Prayerfully consider inviting someone to join you for Holy Thursday, Good Friday, Easter Vigil or Easter Sunday Mass.
